#### British Architects in Berlin

Last night, a specially chartered plane arrived at Tempelhof with a group of thirtueix British architects on a visit to Berlin organised by the Architectural Association of London. Besides being a social and professional club, the Association boasts the largest and most forwardlooking school of architects in the country, based on the traditions of its founders who, as students one hundred years ago, rejected the academic training fostered on them by their elders, and started the Association in protest.

The visiting party, led by the Vice-President of the Association Denis Clarke Hall includes students as well as prominent architects. Among them are Miss Jane Drew and Maxwell Fry. CBE, who were responsible for the planning of the new Indian capital at Chandinarh in conjunction with the Swiss-horn architect Le Corbusier and Ove Arun CRE chief structural annineer to many of London's South Bank pavilions exected for the 1951 Festival of Britain Exhibition.

The prime motive of the trip is to visit the Interhau and associated building and town-planning projects in Berlin, and the party will meet architects from West Berlin and Switzerland at a formal recention this evening. They are staying at the Plaza Hotel, and will remain in the city until 3 September
